



BIDEFORD FAIR (HERITAGE DAY) SPECIAL EVENT STATION

My thanks to Mike (G4KXQ) for providing the following report and also to Ray (M0TLO) for the photo.

The club was once again invited to participate in the Bideford Fair (originally Heritage Day) in July. All members of the club were invited to participate but the bulk of the attendees were the committee members. The team consisted of John (G3JKL), Steve (G6SQX), Alan (M6CCH), Mike (G4KXQ), Ray (M0TLO), Dave (G4XWQ) and Graham (G1ZTJ).

The club marquee was quickly erected and the decision was



made to use the club Off Centre Dipole. A suitable tree was selected at the required distance and much fun was had by all trying to get a rope over a suitable branch whilst not maiming passing members of the public with the rope end weighted with a plumbers isolation valve. A dynamic risk assessment was conducted during this phase with the passing public suitable restrained. A 7m Sotabeams fibreglass pole was used as the main centre point guyed to keep it upright and fluorescent jackets being tied to each guy as a warning.

Fred (G0EOB) and Helen (G0EOA) arrived to supply the generator. Fred was sporting a magnificent shiner around his eye following a fall a few days previous.

The HF band conditions during the previous week were described a poor even though were still 3 years away from the sunspot minimum. As a contingency Dave (G4XWQ) brought along a dual band 2m/70cm multimode, a 70cm FM Transceiver along with a dual band dipole to work our two local repeaters.

The new club Icon 7410 was used initially on forty meters but as expected contacts were suitably sparse. There were a few special event stations on 40 meters and a singular contact with Brian (M0BRB). 20 meters wasn't leaping but there was a contest running so we worked a few Russians along with a few other contacts from non-contest stations including a nice contact with 9A5O in Croatia who insisted on going through the whole 'this is amateur radio' spiel with out any members of the public being present inside the marquee. A contact with HG17EYOF to celebrate the European Youth Olympic Festival was also made which provided a few laughs as we tried to understand what the call-sign was.

Although contacts were few and far between, the afternoon was usefully spent exploring the many features of the new superior Icon rig with explanations and demonstrations of the use of various filters and RF gain for some of our newer licensed amateurs. We also played with some IOS amateur programs such as PSK3 and SSTV that Mike had loaded on his iPod. We were joined in the afternoon by Laurence (G4XHK), Keith (G0AYM) and his wife Jean (G0BYL).

Graham and Dave had more luck on VHF and UHF with

both repeaters being kept occupied for most of the day. It was surprising how much the activity there is on the repeaters if an effort is made to just drop a call out.



We had a few visitors dropping in during the day. Some of them were ex-CBers and did show an interest that may result in some new members.

If were invited next year we could organise it to be more of a club social as it was a great opportunity to chat and play with the rigs.

Fortunately the weather stayed mainly dry all day with only a few drizzles of rain in stark contrast to the deluge that dumped on Barnstaple 9 miles away.

The event was well attended by other organisations including the Bideford classic car and motorcycle club, Sea Cadets, Falconry and the Kenwith Company of Archers. An arena display of various types was also run during the day providing interests away from the radio.

Subsequent to the event the club has been given a donation of $\pounds 60$ to add to club funds.
